SAES Equip: New Chaplains!

Are you a newly called School Chaplain? Or are you a Head of School or Rector who will have a new School Chaplain next year? SAES is excited to help you with our Equip New Chaplains program.

The role of the Chaplain is critical to the successful expression and practice of a school's Episcopal Identity. Because fully trained and ordained chaplains who are also skilled classroom practitioners are hard to find and challenging to afford, many Episcopal Schools turn to lay candidates or those ordained in another tradition to lead or supplement their chaplaincy programs. Alternatively, school leaders may have identified someone who is ordained by the Episcopal Church and interested in school chaplaincy but lacks experience in school settings or leading worship specifically for children.

This program is designed for both lay and ordained persons who may be called to serve as Chaplains in school settings. The program will provide participants with a "toolbox" of practical information about the work of the chaplaincy, a network of veteran chaplains and chapel leaders, and a cohort of fellow learners from similar school settings.

ACCREDITATION NOTES

Last month I discussed the importance of building in time to reflect on your school's organizational structure, curriculum, pedagogical practices, and facilities and to make the assessment of student data and progress a part of that reflection. This month I want to remind you of the importance of spending time to review and revise your Parent-Student, Faculty–Staff, and Administrative Handbooks. These documents are fundamental to the effective operation of your school and play a significant role in risk management by establishing clear policies and protocols.

Most of us are inclined to pull out the current year's handbooks, change any dates or calendars, maybe add something to the discipline policy to account for a situation that happened in the current year, and call it good. It's a better idea, however, to review the handbooks with a more critical eye and ask whether you have all the policies and procedures in place that you need to have, and to spend time making sure what you have still makes sense. Perhaps you started storing academic records in the cloud a few years ago—does your records retention policy account for that? Perhaps your medications administration protocol was written before you had a full-time school nurse and wasn't updated? Perhaps a lower school teacher started keeping a classroom pet this year—do you have a Classroom Animals policy?

As an aid to schools, SAES provides an Annual Safety Checklist which lists policies, protocols, and documentation that schools should have. This is a great resource for you and your team as you review your handbooks and make sure they include all that you might need. The Safety Checklist will be sent next week to all heads of school in the Association. We encourage you to look over the Checklist with your team and consider whether 1) you have all items listed and 2) whether you have been intending to revise some of the items that are listed. No actions are required on the part of your school with regard to this checklist; it is merely a resource to assist you in your work this summer as you prepare for the 2024-25 school year.
